**MATTHEW from Magic Lantern's visit to Rosary School was amazing! We talked about the paintings he showed us and we tried to guess what the Greek myths were.**

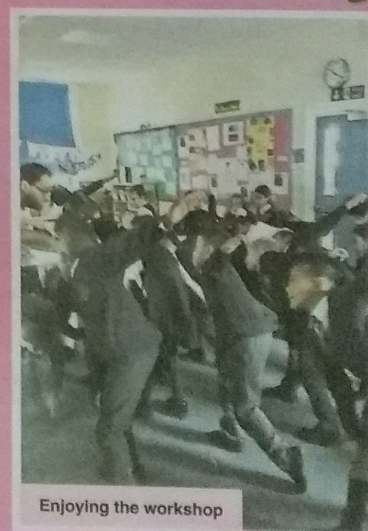
He showed us some sculptures of gods and we tried to strike a pose. He also showed us a painting about the myth of Theseus and the Minotaur, which we have been learning about in class.
